FY 2014 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant: 2014-H1539-MO-DJ

Program Narrative:

This is a joint application on behalf of the County of Boone and the City of Columbia, Missouri. This application is submitted for the FY 2014 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program: Local Solicitation.

Since this is a joint application, the funding will support a variety of needs in Boone County, Missouri. This funding will be split two ways between the Boone County Sheriff's Department and the City of Columbia Police Department.

The County of Boone and the City of Columbia are routing an agreement through both governing bodies as certified disparate jurisdictions to divide the grant funds in a 40/60-split manner. The County of Boone, specifically the Sheriff's Department, has agreed to apply for the grant on behalf of both entities. Pursuant to this agreement, the County of Boone will receive \$18,494.40 (40%) of the total \$46,236.00 local award. The City of Columbia will receive the balance of \$27,741.60 (60%).

PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS:

Columbia Police Department Digital Portable Radio Communications Program:

The City of Columbia Missouri is a growing community. The city has a population of over 112,000 people and encompasses more than 50 square miles. Columbia is home to several institutions of higher learning including, the University of Missouri, Columbia College and Stephens College. These institutions bring thousands of students to our community adding to our population.

The Columbia Missouri Police Department has the primary responsibility of policing the community. The Columbia Missouri Police Department employs over 160 commissioned officers that are faced with the day to day challenges of providing police services. Their duties require constant, reliable communications in various and sometimes hazardous environments. Radio communications often include safety information for public safety personnel responding to emergency situations. Durable, high-quality radio equipment is essential to maintain communication and critical for officer safety.

The Columbia Police Department has 100 portable radios currently being utilized that are well past the recommended life span and are slated for replacement. Part of our technology plan calls for the replacement of our remaining, aging radios. The amount of the radio purchase is beyond the funding of our current budget.

The Columbia Missouri Police Department's role in providing law enforcement service to the community hinges on efficient communications. Our department has determined the Motorola XTS 2500 Model 2 Digital Portable Radio is the most effective and efficient solution at maintaining and improving this service.

Standard Features and Benefits of the Motorola XTS 2500 Model 2 Digital Portable Radio

The Motorola XTS 2500 Model 2 Digital Portable Radio will not only meet the new FCC requirements that went into effect in 2013, but it will bring the Columbia Missouri Police Department up-to-date in communications technology. This new technology will greatly enhance our effectiveness in emergency situations that call for a multi-agency response. The ability to communicate in this way is important when situations develop that call for resources beyond what the City of Columbia can provide. This is possible because the radios will function with other radio systems that outside agencies such as the Boone County Sheriff's Department, Missouri State Highway Patrol and the University of Missouri Police Department currently operate on.

Last year we were able to purchase 11 new Motorola XTS 2500 Model 2 Digital Portable Radios using Byrne Grant funds. If funding is approved for this next grant cycle, the Columbia Police Department plans to purchase twelve (12) Motorola XTS 2500 Model 2 Digital Portable Radios through a competitive bid process created from previous radio purchases. This process helps ensure the funding is used efficiently and the cost of the services is appropriate.

Boone County Sheriff's Department Covert Surveillance Equipment Program:

Boone County Sheriff's Department All-In-One GPS Tracking device:

The Boone County Sheriff's Department Pro-active Investigation Unit currently uses a older model GPS tracking device. This request is for funding to purchase a new updated tracking device.

This request is for an updated device only. The software currently owned by the Sheriff's Department will be fully compatible with the new device.

A global positioning system (GPS) tracking device sends a radio signal to a computer network which records the location, and allows officers to monitor the location of the tracking device in real time. The tracking device can be placed on an item to be tracked and is self-contained. The tracking device cannot transmit or record images or voice (sound) information. The tracking device can only be used in a criminal investigation with a judge's order.

The current GPS device used by the Sheriff's Department is older technology and no longer supported by the manufacturer. The unit is showing it's age. For example, the volt meter on the device is no longer working properly so an accurate estimation of battery life remaining is difficult. The new unit will have newer, enhanced features.

If funding is approved, this GPS tracking device will enhance and improve our current capabilities. Some of the responsibilities of the Pro-active Investigations Unit include search warrant service, high risk arrest warrant service, drug distribution/manufacturing investigations, and other special operations. Surveillance and intelligence gathering are important aspects of most of these operations. Use of a GPS tracking device will supplement visual surveillance and other investigative techniques and will prevent suspects from detecting officers conducting visual surveillance. Better intelligence and surveillance creates better operational plans, stronger cases being sent for prosecution, and a greater margin of safety for everyone involved.

Boone County Sheriff's Department Covert Cellular Transmission and Recording System:

This funding request is for a cellular based audio surveillance system including a covert cellular device and a cellular repeater command unit.

This covert cellular transmission and recording system will give the Sheriff's Department the capability to covertly monitor and digitally record audio during investigations (during a drug deal for instance).

The Sheriff's Department does not currently have any equipment similar to this equipment.

Our current equipment is many years old and based on old radio frequency (RF) analog technology. This is an older and somewhat outdated technology. The security and capabilities of this newer cellular based digital technology is a vast improvement over our older analog equipment.

If funding is approved, this cellular surveillance equipment will enhance and improve our current capabilities. Some of the responsibilities of the Pro-active Investigations Unit include search warrant service, high risk arrest warrant service, drug distribution/manufacturing investigations, and other special operations. Surveillance and intelligence gathering are a important aspect of most of these operations. Use of this cellular surveillance equipment will supplement and enhance other investigative techniques. Better intelligence and surveillance creates better operational plans, stronger cases being sent for prosecution, and a greater margin of safety for everyone involved.

Boone County Sheriff's Department Weapons Enhancement Program:

Boone County Sheriff's Department Weapons Mounted Flashlight:

The Boone County Sheriff's Department would like to utilize monies from the Justice

Assistance Grant to finish purchasing weapon mounted flashlights to be utilized on patrol rifles.

This would allow the department to equip all deputies issued a patrol rifle with a weapon mounted flashlight.

Over the last several years the Boone County Sheriff's Department has phased in patrol rifles for those within the Enforcement Division to include the School Resource Officers and Narcotics Investigators. This was done to better equip and prepare deputies to deal with the challenges they are facing. In looking at the 2013 year end statistical data for the Boone County Sheriff's Department, assault and domestic violence reports have basically held to consistent levels over the last 15 years. However, according to Uniform Crime Reporting stats from the Missouri State Highway Patrol's website law enforcement in Boone County is handling more incidents involving the use of firearms. This upward trend has more than doubled from 2004 to 2011.

Upon further analysis of data collected nationwide (source: Law Enforcement Officers Killed in Action report) over the last 10 years (2000-2010) shows that a greater number of law enforcement officers are killed or assaulted in the line of duty during low light/no light times of the day. With this in mind, the Boone County Sheriff's Department is working to standardize weapon platforms and equip department firearms with flashlights. In 2011 the department

utilized JAG funding to purchase accessory rail/mounting platforms for the patrol rifles. In order to complete this goal, the department would like to utilize JAG funding to purchase 15 weapon mounted flashlights for currently issued patrol rifles.

Boone County Sheriff's Department Weapons Training Conversion Kits:

If approved the Boone County Sheriff's Department seeks to utilize Justice Assistance Grant funding to purchase 4 simunition patrol rifle conversion kits to allow department personnel to conduct force on force training.

In 2013 the Boone County Sheriff's Department recognized a training deficiency with regard to force on force training. For several years the department has utilized simunition or marking rounds in handgun and shotgun configurations for training. However, force on force training with patrol rifles has not been addressed. In addition, the patrol rifle is also a primary entry weapon for the Special Weapons and Tactics team.

Force on force training is not a new concept and has been in use by law enforcement and the military for quite some time. Force on force training allows departments to train personnel in more realistic situations (scenarios) and with the weapons systems they use every day. Historically, law enforcement agencies have only conducted static firearms training. Force on force training consists of dynamic training scenarios. Allowing personnel to train on weapon malfunction drills, team work, decision making matrices, working through the effects of sympathetic nervous system reaction, tactics and techniques to name a few.

In addition, the Boone County Sheriff's Department is actively working with all local public safety agencies (law enforcement, fire, emergency medical services) to train all Boone County schools and first responders on how to respond to an active shooter or other critical incident.

This model will all apply to any active shooter or critical incident throughout Boone County regardless of the location. The simunition kits would bring a more realistic aspect to the training

If approved this would allow the department to fully implement force on force training across all department issued firearm platforms and more training scenario opportunities.

Boone County Sheriff's Department Range Enhancement Program:

The Boone County Sheriff's Department would like to utilize monies from the Justice Assistance Grant to purchase a permanent 8 x 8.5 x 20 metal storage container for the departments shooting range. Currently the Boone County Sheriff's Department has one8 x 8.5 x 20 metal storage container and one 8 x 10 temporary wooden shed to store paper targets, target sticks, lighting supplies, ammunition, and other accessories when conducting activities at the departments firing range. We have several steel targets that do not have proper secured storage on site. These steel targets are currently stored in the walkway of the metal storage container and have to be moved to access other items during range use. The second storage container will allow us proper storage of the metal targets when not in use on the range.

Boone County Sheriff's Department Portable Radio Communications Program:

The Boone County Sheriff's Department has 49 portable radios currently being utilized that are well past the recommended life span and are slated for replacement. Part of our technology plan calls for the replacement of our remaining, aging radios. The amount of the radio purchase is beyond the funding of our current budget.

The Boone County Sheriff's Department's role in providing law enforcement service to the community hinges on efficient communications. Our department has determined the Motorola XTS 2500 Model 1.5 Digital Portable Radio is the most effective and efficient solution at maintaining and improving this service.

PERFORMANCE MEASURES:

Both applicants within this request are required by Department Policy or State Law to maintain records on various different levels of incidents. This requirement will allow us to query existing data and measure the results of the work performed with the equipment/training gained from this funding request. Both entities in this application currently follow grant reporting guidelines and have proficiency in accurate and timely reporting.

CLOSING:

As per the Memorandum of Understanding agreed upon by both entities, the Boone County Sheriff's Department will be responsible for the application, drawdown, and dissemination of funds to the City of Columbia, and fulfilling all reporting requirements of this grant program.

The Sheriff's Department was chosen for this due to their experience handling JAG funds.

The tracking and reporting of all monies received and disbursed relating to this grant will be accomplished through the use of separate funds and/or accounts established for such purposes.

All monies received from this grant will be recorded, tracked, and reported in such manner as to identify and account for them separately from other County resources.

Since this funding will go toward equipment, both recipients plan to start work on these programs immediately. As soon as the grant funds have been deposited we will route a Budget Amendment proposal through a public hearing at a regular Commission meeting to approve the spending as outlined in this grant application.

The assistance of these grant funds will allow us to purchase much needed equipment that would otherwise not be attainable with our current budget shortfall. On behalf of both applicants encompassed in this application, we would like to thank the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant program, and the reviewers, for this opportunity. During hard financial times like these it is truly hard to make budget decisions that compromise the safety of our employees and citizens. We have worked hard at maintaining a certain level of customer satisfaction; however, the economic situation over the past several years has made this an overwhelming task. These grant funds will certainly help our ailing budget and allow us to focus on more needs in future budget years.

Review Narrative:

The City of Columbia and the County of Boone have been certified as disparate jurisdictions, and are filing this application jointly. Both entities have come to the agreement that the County of Boone, specifically the Boone County Sheriff's Department, will be the Authorized Representative for this application and any subsequent reporting of expended funds. Both entities have agreed on how the FY2014 Byrne JAG funds will be divided and what equipment and programs will be supported by this grant through the respective departments.

The City of Columbia and the County of Boone have drafted an Intergovernmental Agreement which as of the date of this application submission is still in process for signatures. The agreement must pass through two Columbia City Council meetings and two Boone County Commission meetings. Once the agreement is finalized by both entities we can provide a copy of the fully executed document. A copy of the draft agreement has been supplied with this application.

The aforementioned agreement establishes that the City of Columbia and the County of Boone agree to divide the award using a 60/40 split calculation. The City of Columbia agrees that the County of Boone will receive \$18,494.40 of the allotted \$46,236.00 under this joint application; with the balance of \$27,741.60 going to the City of Columbia. The agreement was drafted under the same guidelines as previous years and therefore we see no reason it will not go through.

Notice of the application was read in public forum on May 27, 2014 and made available to the Boone County Commission for the required review. The application was further advertised for a second hearing in the Boone County Commission and on May 29, 2014 a second reading in a public meeting was conducted. Public notices of all Boone County Commission meetings are made by web site posting, local newspaper notice and email distribution. The application was approved by the Boone County Commission on May 29, 2014; a copy of the signed Commission Order has been submitted with this application.

Being subject to review under Executive Order 12372, information for this application was submitted to the State of Missouri for review on May 5, 2014 (a copy of the letter is included with this application).

Title of the project: Boone County & City of Columbia FY 2014 Byrne JAG Budget Assistance Project.
