The regular meeting of the County Commission was called to order at 1:31 p.m. Commissioner Stamper recognized the presence of former County Commissioner Don Sanders.

#### **SUBJECT: Discussion of Scenic Roads**

Randall Kilgore, 201 N. Roby Farm Road, Rocheport; Jean Graebner, 1800 S. Roby Farm Road, Rocheport; Joann Whitley, 303 S. Glenwood Avenue, Columbia; and Marjorie McDermott, 165 N. Roby Farm Road, Rocheport, were present.

Commissioner Vogt commented several groups are interested in the scenic road designation, as are the Road and Bridge Advisory Committee and Long Range Steering Committee.

Ms. McDermott stated they believe the time has come for groups to work together. They would like the Commission to appoint a committee to coordinate the activity.

Ms. McDermott summarized a document titled, "Designation of Protection for County Scene and Historic Roads."

Ms. Graebner stated the document is an outgrowth of meetings with interested citizens and people associated with a number of organizations.

Public Works Director Stan Elmore distributed documentation of a four step program devised by the Road and Bridge Advisory Committee which could be processed by the Committee or the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Commissioner Vogt stated scenic roads should be addressed in the transportation section of the long range plan. She agrees groups should share information, but does not believe the process should be rushed.

Ms. McDermott replied it should be a slow process, but they believe various groups working on the issue should work together.

Commissioner Stamper stated he had not considered the impact on planning and zoning and the long range plan. He agrees it is important to have an informal group comprised of interested parties and Road and Bridge Advisory Committee and Planning and Zoning Commission representatives to compare notes and ensure efforts are not duplicated. Commissioner Stamper requested an opportunity to consult with other parties and advise those present within a week.

## SUBJECT: Discussion with Boone County Board of Health Regarding Lack of Space at Health Department

Kay Libbus, 304 Longfellow Lane, and Dr. Michael Szewczyk, 1404 Highlands Court, were present.

Dr. Szewczyk distributed a document describing personal health services provided by the City of Columbia/Boone County Health Department. Dr. Szewczyk stated there is about 7,700 square feet of space. A space needs assessment conducted by the City indicates 13,500 square feet are needed to accommodate the Health Department without growth. Ms. Libbus, who works in the University of Missouri School of Nursing, has first hand knowledge of the Department.

Ms. Libbus stated the space is inadequate, and continues to become more so. Office space is difficult. Four nurses have been put back in the basement in an inadequate space which does not provide access to the clinic area. There are problems with privacy for clients and staff. There are three examining rooms. The clinics are very full. Even if there are plenty of health care providers, there is no place to put them to see clients. On STD (sexually transmitted disease) nights the doctor's office is turned into an exam room.

Commissioner Stamper asked how long has there been a need for additional space?

Ms. Libbus stated she began working with the Health Department in 1977. At that time, the Department only occupied the basement. The (Women, Infants and Children) WIC program had not moved upstairs. The Department has since extended tendrils throughout the building. The space has been inadequate for as long as she can remember.

Commissioner Vogt asked is one location better than satellite locations or a mobile facility?

Dr. Szewczyk replied if he were a County Commissioner representing the county that would be a valid concern. About thirty percent of the clientele resides outside the City of Columbia. There are many outreach programs. Concerning mobile clinics, a good home base is needed for health care providers. Nurses at the Health Department do not have offices in which to compile reports and make phone calls from. Only certain activities lend themselves to mobile clinics. If a child is sick on a Monday and the clinic comes on Friday, it doesn't do the child much good.

Ms. Libbus stated rural health screenings held five to six times each month are well attended. There used to be child health conferences. People came for regular check-ups, immunizations and developmental testing. For some reason they were not utilized. If they knew what people needed they could perform a lot of activities in various locations. However, some activities need a central location. For example, when equipment which is not very mobile is needed.

Commissioner Stamper stated he is interested in satellite activities--making public health care more accessible. He recognizes the need for a home base, but what about privatization?

Dr. Szewczyk replied none of the hospitals in town have jumped at the task. In fact, they gave money to the clinic at Parkade to keep clients out of emergency rooms and away from the hospital. Hospitals are not placing their clinics in areas which capture the patients which need to

be seen. They are putting the clinics where buses rarely go. It is reasonable to look at the concept and see if someone can offer services cheaper, but we need to make sure the little services, like STD clinics, are addressed. A lot of domestic violence and child abuse are aborted through the clinic. The nurses are involved with families. He believes that is something that would be lost if services were contracted.

Commissioner Stamper stated the Commission struggles with the question whether it is time for the County to venture into public health care on its own. Ideally, a strong public health program would control how private services are purchased. Hospitals call bills they cannot collect indigent care. One problem with the Health Department is there has been a reluctance to provide outreach programs on a long term basis. There are children and others who are not being seen. Something is going to have to be done to make the Health Department an efficient place to work.

## **SUBJECT: Discussion of Call for Election Concerning Appointment of Citizen Committee** for Composition of County Constitution

Mr. Patton stated the process for adopting a county constitution is simple. The first step is to call an election on the question of whether the circuit court should appoint a commission to write a constitution. If the ballot issue passes by majority vote the seven circuit judges will appoint a commission within sixty days of certification of the election result. The membership would be split between political parties. A second election would be held to determine whether the constitution written as the form of government for the county is to be adopted. The question has to be put on the ballot thirty days after the constitution is completed, no later than one year after their appointment. There are provisions in Amendment One which allow alternative forms of government to be submitted on the same ballot. More than one constitution could be placed on the ballot or there could be alternative provisions for the same constitution. If there are alternative provisions, the provision gaining the greatest amount of votes would be adopted. If adopted, the constitution would take effect as set forth in the document. If the issue fails, a period of time must pass before the issue can be brought up again.

Commissioner Miller stated she believes the citizens of Boone County gave the Commission a mandate in November. The issue should be placed on the ballot.

Bob Northrup, 903 N. College, stated he does not think the public gave a mandate. Nothing on the ballot said the petition process would be deleted with an election being held instead. It said the number of signatures required would be reduced. You do not get a mandate from a deceptive ballot issue. There have been several elections on the issue of planning and zoning. The issue of planning and zoning can be placed back on the ballot with a five or ten percent petition of the people. When the issue passed, it was only because the students were allowed to vote and they were voting a liberal pattern. In St. Charles County, an election was held in November of 1991 where for rezoning to be considered it could cost up to \$500. Section 64.010 RSMo. provides once the County authorizes a Planning and Zoning Commission, citizens are stuck with it. Government can become abusive. Three people is not enough to be making decisions for the county. In the previous charter written, there was a general grant of powers clause. That is opposite of the tenth amendment of the constitution. The powers in the constitution belong to the United States, all others belong to the States and to the people.

Commissioner Stamper stated the Commission understands Mr. Northrup's concern. The question before the Commission is whether to ask people whether they want a constitution writing commission appointed.

Mr. Northrup stated he will limit comments to the first issue. He wants the public to be aware there is no way to repeal planning and zoning once this has occurred. No matter how abusive it gets, the people have to live with it.

Mr. Sanders stated he believes the Commission is on the right course and hopes the issue will be placed on the ballot. He agrees with Commissioner Miller that there was a mandate in November. County government operates under a concept which stems from the 19th century where the State decides what happens to counties. That concept evolved when county populations were small and they did not have financial resources to do a number things. It is very different today, especially in

first class counties such as Boone. He thinks democracy works best when people are governed close to home. He has trouble understanding the concept that we can function better if we are governed from a distance. Under that concept, in America, we would have been satisfied with the British parliament. He wants a constitution written before we decide whether we want it or not.

Carolyn Dietiker, 3100 W. Willis Road, Columbia, stated we are not a democracy, we are a constitutional republic. Is the ultimate goal a merger of city and county government?

Commissioner Stamper replied no one can say what the constitution will contain. Much is made of the need to consolidate services and to cooperate. He hopes that would be given consideration.

County Clerk Wendy S. Noren, Recorder of Deeds Bettie Johnson and County Commission Administrative Coordinator Beckie Jackson summarized the bid award recommendation reflected in her memorandum to the Commission dated February 1, 1995.

Commissioner Stamper moved that the County Commission of the County of Boone award bid number 4-24JAN95, as outlined on the attached document, to Check Office Equipment, Columbia Office Supply and Mayer Malnick Interiors. All other bids are rejected.

Commissioner Vogt seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously. Order 56-95.
