The meeting was called to order at 1:32 p.m.

Subject: Boone Hospital Center – Discussion of Community Partnership

Mike Shirk, Chairman of Community Partnership, and Michael Bloemke, Executive Director of Community Partnership, were present on behalf of this item.

Mike Shirk stated there will be a meeting on September 24, 2002 at 7:00 p.m. at the Senior Center. The State of Missouri has drastically reduced funding for Community Partnerships throughout the State. The Columbia/Boone County Partnership was no exception to the cut back.

The F.A.C.T. (Family and Community Trust) Board, which is similar to a governing board, for The Community Partnership has asked each Partnership to reduce their budget in line with the State reductions and to become more facilitators than funders and facilitators. In the past, The Community Partnership had money and several people would come to the board for funding. With these new cutbacks, there is no funding. The State, the F.A.C.T. Board, the Department of Social Services has requested The Community Partnership to concentrate on facilitating a meeting that would lead to a community wide agenda. When they mean community wide, they mean the community of Columbia/Boone County. This is what The Community Partnership will do at their first meeting under this new mandate and reduced budget, to have a community wide meeting with all agencies. They have also requested the Chamber of Commerce, the City Council, the County Commission and other elected officials to attend this meeting.

Mike Bloemke stated The Community Partnership, beginning with the meeting on September 24, convene a large meeting to identify priority outcomes of the community. Out of these meetings, there is a hope to find people who are committed to continuing to work toward to developing an answer. They have already worked with groups and organizations that have already identified their own priorities. Pulling this information together to have as a part of the overall agenda, categorize the information and identify teams of organizations and agencies that are willing to do work to figure out which goals need to be achieved and how those goals should be achieved.

They believe there are a lot of resources in the community but there will never be enough to accomplish all the goals set forth. By getting all the right partners together working on specific issues, progress should be made toward using resources better and making progress on a small number of identified priorities. The focus has been on neighborhood type issues over the last five years. They will try to link that work with broader community issues. They hope to move from this meeting to doing work with other communities in the county. Mr. Bloemke noted there has already been work done in Centralia. He requested support from the Commission and information on other communities that might be ready to help. The Partnership knows the priorities in some of the outlying communities may not be the same as Columbia. He hopes there will be a good turnout at the meeting with direction on where to go in the next several months. Any support The Community Partnership can receive from the Commission will be appreciated.

Commissioner Stamper asked if the support would come in the form of suggestion or in the form of financing. Mr. Shirk stated they are not present for a monetary endorsement but for the Commission's endorsement of the new direction of the Community Partnership. He does not believe the Partnership will come back to the Commission asking for money but this does not mean some of the communities will not.

Commissioner Miller stated she believes if the Caring Communities had begun with this type of project before any funding was received, they would have been light years ahead. She believes this is right move to define what the communities needs are, what resources there are to serve those needs, and where the focus needs to be to receive more funding. She thanked Mr. Shirk and Mr. Bloemke for coming to the Commission.

Commissioner Stamper stated some of the communities in Boone County are a bit more organized and focused than others. Ashland has a very active Chamber group. Commissioner Miller noted they are working on youth drug issues that they could probably use some support on.

Commissioner Stamper stated the City of Hallsville has a few civic groups also. The Commission could provide some contract names. To look at this issue from a county-wide perspective is a good idea. Mr. Shirk stated that is Community Partnership's commitment.

There was no further discussion on this issue.

The Commission thanked Mr. Shirk and Mr. Bloemke for coming to the meeting.

Subject: Tax Rate Hearing

Wendy S. Noren, Boone County Clerk, was present on behalf of this item.

Wendy Noren stated the Group Homes levy, which is a voted levy and the Commission has no control over, tax rate ceiling was increases by 0.0005.

There was slow growth this year in the County's assessed valuation, which increased by 2.2%, primarily because of reductions in personal property. Many of the large personal property taxpayers have experienced over the last two years significant reductions because they are not replacing their inventory. Some of the larger companies who maintain a lot of equipment have not been upgrading their inventory. Because of this, the County has not seen growth in that area like the growth during the 1990's.

There are two County controlled levies; General Revenue and Road and Bridge. The Road and Bridge is set at \$0.05 in agreement with the County's sales tax. There is also a mandatory sales tax role back. The County has also been voluntarily keeping the property tax rate the same. Overall, the property tax roll backs, because of sales tax collections, is a little over \$0.25. Without sales tax and the Commission voluntarily keeping the rates lower, there could be almost a \$0.26 increase in property taxes for people in the County.

The majority of the Commission deals with rates submitted by the other taxing entities in the County. Ms. Noren noted this is the order used to extend the tax books for use by the Clerk and the Collector for tax season.

Commissioner Stamper opened the floor for a public hearing.

There was no one wishing to speak.

Commissioner Stamper closed the floor for a public hearing.

Ms. Noren noted the County-wide levies for 2001; General Revenue was \$0.13, Road and Bridge was \$0.05, and Group Homes was \$0.1189. This year the proposed order has General Revenue as \$0.13, Road and Bridge as \$0.05, and Group Homes as \$0.1194.

Commissioner Stamper asked if Ashland raised their tax rates. Mr. Noren stated Ashland increased their debt service levy, which is \$0.44 and was \$0.2156. For Ashland, the net overall will not be quite that high because the Southern Boone County Fire Protection District did decrease their debt service levy. They have been paying off some of their bonds and the levy dropped almost \$0.11. This will mitigate some of the increase that the City of Ashland residents will see.

The majority of the levies stayed close to last years rates but the only major increase was Centralia School, which was voted on in the April election. The increase is from \$3.22 in 2001 to \$3.56 for 2002.

Commissioner Miller moved to set the 2002 tax rates per hundred dollars of assessed valuation for county purposes as follows:
