RESOLVE TO BE READY


As we step into a new year, let's commit to a resolution that can make a difference for ourselves, our families, and our communities: being prepared for disasters. Here's how you can take action:


1. Stay Informed

Knowledge is power! Keep updated on potential hazards in your area. Sign up for <u>Smart 911</u>, download weather apps, and familiarize yourself with evacuation routes and emergency procedures. Staying informed ensures you're ready when it matters most.

2. Be Prepared

Create a plan tailored to your household. Discuss how you'll communicate and where you'll meet during an emergency. Include considerations for pets, older family members, and those with specific needs. Share your plan with loved ones to ensure everyone is on the same page. 3. Build Your Emergency Kit


Assemble a disaster kit with essentials: water, non-perishable food, medications, flashlights, batteries, and important documents. Customize your kit to suit your family's unique needs, and don't forget supplies for pets!

Our office recommends to start small, especially if your family is on a tight budget. Make a plan for items you will need and try to stockpile a little every week. Check out <u>Ready.gov/kit</u> for a supply list to get you started

4. Get Involved in Your Community

Join local preparedness groups or volunteer with local organizations whos mission is to help others. Building a connected community strengthens everyone's ability to respond to emergencies effectively. Together, we can support one another before, during, and after a disaster.

Our Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is a program where volunteers can support disaster preparedness activities and programs that occur across the county. Every month, we like to spotlight one of our local partners who work hard to make Boone County an amazing place to live, work, and recreate in. This month we'd like to recognize Jane Williams!

Please introduce yourself and your organization:

I'm Jane Williams, co-founder and executive director of Love Columbia, a local nonprofit organization that has served our community since 2008. Prior to establishing and leading Love Columbia, I worked as a professional social worker in Columbia for several decades, primarily serving in hospital, foster care, and supported living settings. I was also engaged in advocacy efforts including spearheading a wrongful conviction exoneration and organizing disaster relief.

What does your organization provide?

Love Columbia connects relationships and resources to love our neighbors forward. We come alongside anyone in Columbia who is struggling to provide for their basic needs or create a path to the life they want for themselves and their family.

Our services focus on improving finances, housing and employment and promoting social connectedness across the community. We provide coaching, classes, supportive services, strategic financial assistance, and material goods through The Love Seat furniture bank and resale store. We match the time, skills and resources of community volunteers and donors with the needs of their neighbors to promote the flourishing of us all.

BOONE COUNTY SPOTLIGHT

What are some challenges you face?

We have steadily expanded the scope of our services and the number of people we have served each year to better meet the needs of the community.

In 2024, we enrolled 2,844 adults in our programs and provided 4,362 coaching sessions. As many of the people we served were struggling to secure or maintain affordable housing, I would have to say our biggest challenge is the current housing shortage and rent prices that have steadily risen over the past five years. We partner with Boone County's Upward Mobility initiative to host an affordable housing coalition of community members seeking solutions and welcome anyone who wants to join the effort.

How do you like to spend your time outside of work?

I love spending time with friends, listening to audible books and podcasts, enjoying local restaurants and worshipping with my church community. I try to see my two children and eight grandchildren as often as possible which means trips to Kansas City and Grand Rapids.

What's one thing on your bucket list?

I've never had a bucket list. I try to live each day to the fullest and stick to my "Stay Fascinated" life motto which keeps me curious and enthusiastic. After losing my eyesight 12 years ago, travel lost much of its appeal. I now find people much more interesting than places. There are so many amazing people to get to know every day!

Thanks so much for the work you do – what else should our readers know about you and your organization?

Our favorite thing is to match the time, skills and resources of people who want to help with the needs, hopes and dreams of their neighbors. Love Columbia provides the structure and opportunity for everyone in our community to give and receive meaningful and strategic help. Every day, we see one person's contribution– whether it is what they enjoy doing or an unneeded item they have – change the life of a neighbor And add joy to their own life as they give. TRAINING & EXERCISE


In December, our office hosted Integrated Preparedness Planning Workshop (IPPW) where partners from around the County were involved in.
