FINDING OF PUBLIC NUISANCE AND ORDER FOR ABATEMENT

NOW on this 12th day of January 2010, the County Commission of Boone County, Missouri met in regular session and entered the following findings of fact, conclusions of law and order for abatement of nuisance:

Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law

The County Commission finds as fact and concludes as a matter of law the following:

- 1. The Boone County Code of Health Regulations (the "Code") are officially noticed and are made a part of the record in this proceeding.
- 2. The City of Columbia/Boone County Health Department administrative record is made a part of the record in this proceeding and incorporated herein by reference. In addition, any live testimony of the official(s) of the department and other interested persons are made a part of the record in this proceeding.
- 3. A public nuisance exists described as follows: trash and junk and derelict/unlicensed/junk-filled/dismantled/inoperable gold 4 door Buick and red extended cab Ford Ranger
- 4. The location of the public nuisance is as follows: Lot 1 Mill Creek terrace 2753 W Mill Creek Terrace a/k/a parcel # 16-800-34-02-001.00 01 Section 34, Township 48, Range 13 as shown by deed book 0707 page 0619, Boone County
- 5. The specific violation of the Code is: junk and trash in violation of section 6.5 of the Code and derelict/unlicensed/junk-filled/dismantled/inoperable automobiles violation of 6.9 of the Code.
- 6. The Health Director's designated Health Official made the above determination of the existence of the public nuisance at the above location. Notice of that determination and the requirement for abatement was given in accordance with section 6.10.1 of the Code on the ___ day of ____, 20__, to the property owner, occupant, and any other applicable interested persons.
- 7. The above described public nuisance was not abated. As required by section 6.10.2 of the Code, the property owner, occupant, and any other applicable interested persons were given notice of the hearing conducted this date before the Boone County Commission for an order to abate the above nuisance at government expense with the cost and expense thereof to be charged against the above described property as a special tax bill and added to the real estate taxes for said property for the current

year.

8. No credible evidence has been presented at the hearing to demonstrate that no public nuisance exists or that abatement has been performed or is unnecessary; accordingly, in accordance with section 6.10.2 of the Code and section 67.402, RSMo, the County Commission finds and determines from the credible evidence presented that a public nuisance exists at the above location which requires abatement and that the parties responsible for abating such nuisance have failed to do so as required by the Health Director or Official's original order referred to above.

Order For Abatement Chargeable As a Special Assessment To The Property

Based upon the foregoing, the County Commission hereby orders abatement of the above described public nuisance at public expense and the Health Director is hereby authorized and directed to carry out this order.

It is further ordered and directed that the Health Director submit a bill for the cost and expense of abatement to the County Clerk for attachment to this order and that the County Clerk submit a certified copy of this order and such bill to the County Collector for inclusion as a special assessment on the real property tax bill for the above described property for the current year in accordance with section 67.402, RSMo.

the older buildings and subdivisions throughout Columbia. These retrofits can help reduce peak flows and contain pollutants on site which will protect downstream waterbodies, may reduce flooding and channel degredation, and protect aquatic life.

Additionally, design engineers are struggling with new stormwater requirements and regulations. Low-impact development and pervious technologies are modeled from the East Coast, where there is a higher percentage of sand in the soil profile. These infiltration techniques do not always work in our heavy clay soils. The County and City are both requiring open spaces and deep-rooted vegetation as a treatment in new development and redevelopment. Unfortunatly, it is unclear if, or how quickly deep rooted vegetation can change the infiltration capacity or runoff rate of the soil. Studies from the midwest have shown that infiltration increases during the first six years in an agricultural setting, but these studies have not been done in an urban environment.

WATER QUALITY CONCERNS: Both Hinkson Creek and Rocky Fork Creek are impaired streams. These streams flow into Perche Creek, which discharges into the Missouri River. The Bear Creek Tributary of Rocky Fork is a growing concern for Columbia Residents and StreamTeams. Hinkson Creek is a dynamic stream system, with a drinage area of 90 sq miles. This creek runs southwest through agriculture and pasture land, former minning land, and urban land. The converted Katy Trail system and Flat Branch park recreational areas provides our residents with a connection to the creek system. The recent TMDL discussions and excessive preciptation has raised awerness in the community on the flooding problems, and stream degredation issues in the watershed.

2. PROVIDE A BRIEF AND CLEAR STATEMENT OF THE PROJECT PURPOSE.

The purpose of this project is to:

- 1. Implement activities that will help achieve the goals of the Draft Hinkson Creek Total Maximum Daily Load, the Hinkson Creek Watershed Management Plan, and protect other streams in Columbia from nonpoint source pollution.
- 2. Retrofit three properties with stormwater best management practices to help reduce NPS pollution and hydrologic load to the receiving streams.
- 3. Monitor the performance of selected BMPs with respect to pollutants and hydrologic response.
- 4. Provide BMP performance information to engineers, developers, city construction and maintenance staff, and state and local stormwater managers, so they can make informed decisions based on local conditions, (soils, rainfall, cost to install and maintain, public acceptance).

stormwater controls. Lacking stormwater management, residents are experiencing problems with erosion from peak flows, flooding and permanently standing water. To reduce peak flows and flooding, this residential subdivision will be retrofitted with 65 rain gardens/rain barrels, 75 tree plantings, 20 flow-dissipation devices, 3 community stormwater treatment features, and 15 soil amendment plots over the 4-year grant period. Since many of these retrofits will occur on private property, this will be done on a volunteer basis, through cost-share with a required maintenance agreement.

MONITORING COMPONENT

- a. To quantify the effectiveness of the commercial site stormwater treatments with retrofit construction, the site outfitted with monitoring equipment to determine the reduction in pollutant load as water leaves the site. Post construction water quality and quantity will also be measured below the step-pool structure to determine the effectiveness of this innovative BMP. These sites will be established post-construction and monitored throughout the grant period.
- b. Cut from proposal
- c. To quantify the reduction in peak flow and runoff downstream, a large residential subdivision, will be equipped with a single climate station and a flow gauge during the first year of the project. These gauges will monitor rainfall and stream response prior, during and post construction, for the rain gardens/barrels, community stormwater features, flow dissipaters and tree planting.
- d. To definitively quantify infiltration and evaporation rates, 45 rain gardens in the residential subdivision will be equipped with pressure transducers. Infiltrometers will be used to quantify infiltration capacity prior to installation. Local climate parameters will be monitored with the climate station mentioned above to quantify mass and evapotranspiration flux.
- e. To determine if the infiltration rate can be modified in our heavy clay soils, 15 amendment test plots (with no-treatment control plots) will be established during the second year of the project. These plots will be deep tilled, amended (with sand and mulch), and re-vegetated. Fifteen of the plots will then be monitored to quantify the change in both infiltration rate and runoff during and following rainfall events, for at least 2 growing seasons.

OUTREACH PROGRAM

- a. Contractors, JobPoint students and City workers Through kick-off meetings, workshops and other training events, at least 50 city staff, contractors and JobPoint participants will receive at least five hours of training on the proper installation and maintenance of stormwater BMPs. (Bioretention/Bioswale, underground detention, pervious pavement, step pools, and ultra urban tree planters) during the four year project.
- b. Residents and downtown visitors An interactive website will be created to provide an opportunity for residents to learn about the effects of stormwater runoff and ways to reduce their impact. This along with promotions that include videos, personal appearances, tours, watershed signs, stream clean ups, handouts and t-shirts we will promote and encourage individuals to visit and explore the watershed. This will create a sense of personal ownership, and lifelong stewardship of the watershed and the aquatic community.
- c. To keep the citizens of Columbia and Boone County informed of and involved in the project, a minimum of twelve (12) videos ranging from 5-7 minutes will be created during the 4 year project. The videos will cover a wide range of NPS issues, including BMP construction, monitoring and water quality, Ultra Urban Forests how they work and what they do, etc. It is anticipated that at least 10,000 people will view each video, which will be aired on Mediacom 80, Charter Communications 2, and CenturyTel 601. The videos will also be available on the project website.
- d. Engineers By the end of the project, the engineering community will receive quantifiable evidence supporting the infiltration and runoff rates for rain gardens, and soil amendments using local soils and rainfall distributions. These quantifiably validated BMPs will include design specifications and cost estimates. Pollution reduction information will also be provided for Bioswales/bioretention, step pools, and underground detention. This information will be provided to the engineering community through presentations, newsletters, and workshops. It is anticipated that at least 30 engineers will attend the membership meetings of the Missouri Society of Professional Engineers (MSPE), and an additional 30 will review the on-line newsletters.

- Outreach Program Mike Heimos is the Stormwater Educator for Columbia. Mr. Heimos will be responsible for setting the training events with the City employees, contractors and JobPoint students. Mr. Heimos will also coordinate and oversee the video production with the City Channel. Other responsibilities will include education and awareness events that will target residents, students and visitors to the downtown area.
- Stewardship Program Steve Johnson will oversee the AmeriCorps staff, provide staff with training and resources needed to create a successful stewardship program for the residents at Sunrise Estates.
- Grant administration and invoicing Georganne Bowman will be responsible for setting steering committee meetings, quarter reporting and invoicing, tracking the project objectives, and ensuring that the goals of the project are met. Ms. Bowman will also be resposible for coordination with DNR, and other project sponsors/partners. Ms. Bowman will provide all documentation to DNR, including final products and reports.

2. IF APPLICABLE, DESCRIBE HOW CONTRACTING AND SUBCONTRACTING WILL BE DONE.

The monitoring aspect of this project will be subcontracted, with the University of Missouri - Columbia. This contract will cover the BMP monitoring and assessment. The contractor will develop a QAPP, purchase all monitoring supplies, conduct the monitoring, analyze the results, and report back to the grant at the end of the contract. This contract will cover all costs for services. Other contracts will be bid out following the County's purchasing protocols, or cost-share protocols established during the Hinkson Creek Restoration Projects. Possible contracts would be for construction of BMPs, landscaping, catering, or speaking.

Technology – Current donations have been confirmed for videotaping, web design, public service announcements, and information on CATV

Research base – By partnering with the University, the project gains numerous resources, including student labor, spin-off graduate studies and widespread project recognition through presentations, and potential publications.

D. IMPLEMENTATION OF BMPS

1. FOR IMPLEMENTING BMPS, LIST THE PRACTICES AND HOW THEY WILL ADDRESS THE WATERSHED CONCERNS/POLLUTANTS.

Hinkson Creek has been on the 303(d) list since 1998 for unknown toxicity. In October 2009 the Department of Natural Resources drafted a TMDL that identified the source of the impairment as urban runoff, and calculated a reduction in stormwater runoff volume as a surrogate for any pollutants of concern. Infiltration, evaporation, transpiration are the major transport mechanisms to remove the stormwater volume from the watershed. This project will attempt to quantify some of those mechanisms. The information will be useful for future urban TMDLs, Columbia and Boone County stormwater management, and engineering site designs.

INFILTRATION: The Green-Ampt Infiltration Model estimates an infiltration rate on clay soils between 0.01-0.06 inches per hour, as compared to an infiltration rate of 0.86 inches per hour for a sandy loam. These models are not validated for the Midwest. Therefore, it is difficult for engineers to calculate the infiltration rates for BMPs such as bioretention or rain gardens, bioswales, and even pervious pavement.

Soil Amendments will change the structure and composition of the top 18-24 inches of the soil profile, possibly decreasing runoff and increasing infiltration. But at the same time, the addition of sand to the soil profile will modify the cation exchange capacity, and permanent wilting point of the soil. To provide useful data to our engineers and residents, both the potential positives and negatives must be quantified.

EVAPOTRANSPIRATION (ET) is the evaporation from soils, plant surfaces and open water. ET rates determine the proportion of rainfall that will reach the stream. ET can be as much as 70% of the total precipitation in dry climates, but much less in humid areas. The amount of water that trees can transpire annually depends on a multitude of factors. These include soil water, tree species and canopy size, solar radiation, humidity etc. ET is greatly affected by human activities that alter soil-plant ecosystems and the amount of vegetation in the watershed. The ET rates for the Midwest are largely unknown. By quantifying this data, managers and foresters will be able to calculate the benefits of trees, especially in an urban setting.

Rain Gardens are the final BMP that will be monitored in this project. This component will focus on infiltration capacity and evaporation rates. Rain gardens in other regions are used as an infiltration BMP, but there is a lack of data for our soils and rainfall intensities. This monitoring aspect will provide that data for Missouri.

E. PUBLIC OUTREACH AND PARTICIPATION

1. DESCRIBE THE ACTIVITIES THAT WILL BE CONDUCTED TO PROMOTE THE PROJECT.

There are 5 stages of environmental education.

- Awareness to be cognizant of events; what is the problem, why is it happening?
- Knowledge to understand a situation with familiarity gained through training and experience.
- Skills the ability to use that knowledge to make informed decisions.
- Attitudes or values to understand the relative worth or importance; intrinsic value.
- · Participation or action to take part, advocacy, or endorsement.

Many activities have occurred over the last 5 years to increase the community's awareness of nonpoint source pollution, water quality and stormwater runoff issues in Columbia and Boone County. However, these activities must be ongoing and constantly updated to help keep the community sensitive to the problems and concerns. Some of the activities aimed at problem awareness will include press releases, newsletters, websites, kick-off meetings, and videos. Activities to increase knowledge include the training events targeting the city employees, contractors and Job Point Students. Other knowledge based activities include presentations to MSPE, MAPSS, and CARP and TreeKeepers. It is anticipated that through this project the engineering community will develop the skills necessary to correctly design and calculate the runoff reduction for the selected BMPs. The stewardship program at Sunrise Estates aspires to promote attitude change and participation in stormwater decisions for individual property, and the subdivision as a whole. Clean-up events and other volunteer projects throughout the grant will also promote participation.

2. DESCRIBE HOW THE PROJECT RESULTS WILL BE SHARED WITH THE PUBLIC AND HOW THE PROJECT WILL ENCOURAGE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION.

The stewardship program will work one-on-one with the subdivision residents. They will receive training and educational materials through newsletters, websites, social media, and two hands-on workshops per year. In addition, cost-sharing will also be used to encourage participation.

Maintenance contracts will be developed for community stormwater BMPs that cross property lines. There will be a multitude of opportunities for residents, students and visitors to be involved in and learn about the results from the downtown component of the project. Some of these include annual clean-up events, videos, project website, and press releases.

During the second year of the project, a workshop will be held in conjunction with the membership meeting of the Missouri Society of Professional Engineers. This program will introduce the project to the local engineers with a field tour and the basic monitoring plan. A second workshop will be held during the final year of the project to provide the results of the BMP monitoring, answer questions, and provide the engineers with design specifications.

Other methods of technology transfer will include presentations to the Missouri Association of Professional Soil Scientists and NRCS. The focus will be to provide the results of the soil amendment BMP monitoring. Information will be provided to the TreeKeepers and CARP volunteers on the urban tree planters, and rain garden BMPs. Result sharing will also be part of the wrap-up meetings for the city employees, contractors, and Job Point students.

Physical restoration - Achievement of the project objectives will install at least 100 practices in Hinkson Creek, and 9 practices in the Bear Creek Watershed. (65 rain gardens/rain barrels, 20 flow dissipation devices, 5 ultra-urban tree planters, 3 community stormwater features, 8 commercial site BMPs, a step-pool conveyance system to control stream bank erosion, and 15 soil amendment plots). Not included are the 75 tree plantings in the residential subdivision and increased deep rooted vegetation placed in the rain gardens and soil amendment plots. It is anticipated that these practices will help reduce runoff and flooding, remove pollutants from stormwater, and increase transpiration and infiltration:

KNOWLEDGE OR BEHAVIOR CHANGE

Surveys and questionairs will be used to capture change in knowledge from the kick-off program to the wrap-up meeting. Other behavior changes would include an increase in the frequency the BMPs in this project are used in other areas not funded through this grant.

As you know we have received a Federal grant for the fiscal year 1009/2010 that is passed down through the Missouri Department of Public Safety. That grant is titled the Multi-Jurisdictional Cyber Crime Grant. In this grant we were awarded money to purchase specific equipment and supply items which include a CelleBrite UFED System which is a forensic system for cellular telephones, and a XP Pro Image Backup System which backs up and archives electronic media. The price of each of these items requires that bids be sought prior to purchase.

For the CeleBrite system we received the grant in the amount of \$4,000 and for the XP Pro Image Backup System we received \$10,995.

For the CeleBrite system we have received a sole source letter from the manufacturer of this product. Upon research we have been unable to locate any other venders for this product and according to the manufacturer they do not market this product through other outlets. It is my understanding that in order to purchase this product we must obtain bids even if from different products that have different and generally less productive forensic capabilities.

It is my understanding that the grant we were awarded specifies that these particular items be purchased as agreed upon by the Sate of Missouri. I do not think we are allowed to replace the CeleBrite system with a different system at any cost.

We generally code the revenue to the funding source identified on the Fixed Asset record (tag #), which in this case was #2751, "Donations", so it would have been deposited to the General Fund. In looking over the e-mail communication back in October 2008 between Chad, Leasa, Melinda, and Caryn pertaining to this disposal, it appears we correctly coded it to the General Fund initially, but changed it upon request from the SD because the asset was "acquired through a forfeiture". I don't think we have a "process problem" (which is always a primary concern of mine); we just had a misunderstanding.

So, all that remains to wrap this up is to transfer the funds from the Sheriff's Forfeiture Fund to the General Fund. The applicable accounts for the J/E and Budget Amendment are listed below:

In the Sheriff's Forfeiture Fund: Operating Transfer Out to General Fund-- #83917 In the General Fund: Operating Transfer In from a Special Revenue Fund-- #3917

Good afternoon.

I have now had the time to review the information you provided and I concur with your conclusions.

The RV became a joint asset of the Sheriff's Department and BCFPD by virtue of the Bill of Sale Upon Court Order on February 13, 1992. When the vehicle was sold on govdeals in 2008, it was a disposition of surplus property.

I'm not sure where those surplus property proceeds get routed internally (I defer to June on that) but I am comfortable rendering an opinion that the 2008 sale was a sale of a surplus county asset based on the information you provided me. The fact that the County acquired that asset historically by virtue of a forfeiture should not be relevant to your Forfeiture Fund.

Please let me know if you wish to discuss further and I'll stand by. Have a great weekend.

For the past several months we have been working on cleaning up some accounting errors in the Forfeiture Fund. We are required to submit a yearly Equitable Sharing Agreement and Certification in order to receive Federal Forfeiture Dollars. When we went to submit this years report we found errors dating back to the inception of this fund, and it has taken quite some time to clean up. We finally have it all ready to go except for one thing.

In the attachment I have scanned in 8 pages pertaining to a Recreational Vehicle that we received in the early 90's from a seizure. This vehicle was sold on govdeals in 2008 and generated \$3,050.00 in revenue that we need to put some where (specific to reporting and correct accounting in the AS/400). In reading the documents in the attachment it would appear that the vehicle was seized, and then sold to the Boone County Fire District and the Sheriff's Department for \$10 (the fire district relinquished the vehicle back to us in 2006 or 2007 when they got their new command vehicle).

It was originally thought that since this was a seizure that the money from the sale should go into the Forfeiture Fund. However, from reading through all this I now believe it should just be received as general revenue. Which is where I need your opinion to see if you concur. It looks to me like the cash from the original seizure and the \$10 went to the school fund, and thus we owned the RV through a regular sale transaction. It appears to me the school fund would not play into this now and since the Forfeiture Fund wasn't involved in the beginning it still shouldn't be either.

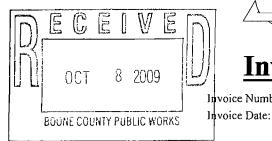

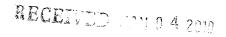

AGREEMENT

This agreement is entered into on this _____ day of ______, 20 by and between the City of Columbia, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called the "City" and Boone County, Missouri, hereinafter called the "County."

WHEREAS, the City of Columbia/Boone County Public Safety Joint Communications has enhanced 9-1-1 capability, which is funded by a special tax collected by the County; and

WHEREAS, Joint Communications personnel, whose compensation is paid for by the users of the dispatching services provided by Joint Communications, is inadequate for performing the duties necessary for adding the information supplied by citizens to the enhanced 9-1-1 system; and

WHEREAS, the County is willing to fund an additional three-quarter time position in Joint Communications to perform the enhanced 9-1-1 data entry duties; and

WHEREAS, the City, which is the employer of Joint Communications staff, is willing to continue to include the position on the staff.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the following covenants and agreements, City and County agree as follows:

- 1. City agrees to continue one staff position in the Columbia/Boone County Public Safety Joint Communications for the purpose of entering information supplied by citizens of Boone County to the enhanced 9-1-1 system and performing other duties related to the enhanced 9-1-1 system.
- 2. City further agrees that said staff position shall be classified as a three-quarter time Administrative Support Assistant I and shall be an employee of the City Public Safety Joint Communications.
- 3. County agrees to pay City the sum of Thirty-one Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$31,850.00) to fund said position from January 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010, payable as follows:
